



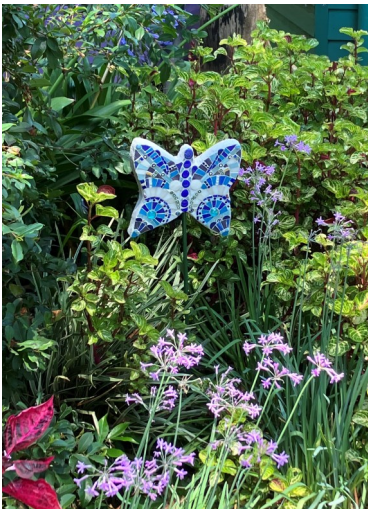

Dear Members,

2022 promised to be a big year at the Centre. Full steam ahead recovering from Covid lockdowns, the Centre had a very busy and productive year.

Starting with the grounds of the Centre, despite the rather wet season we had for 2022, our ever wonderful maintenance duo achieved what must have felt an almost impossible task of completing the flagstone pathway running east/west across the property. This absolute work of art has improved the Centre's access and aesthetics quite dramatically.

The rain has helped our gardener, Liz, to get some fantastic growth in the gardens. The endless maintenance of the garden with weeding, picking up leaf litter, mowing the newly grassed areas, trimming etc is an ongoing task, however the compliments on our grounds are continued reward for all the hard work.

Having such beautiful surrounds has allowed for the installation of some ceramic and mosaic artworks in the gardens which add fun, colour and creative interest. A street library was also installed this year for the greater community and has become a very well used resource. Its position on Hare St is perfect for passers by stop and access it.

The kiln room received much needed attention this year with new roller door installation, concrete floor sealed with paint, new shelving and the maintenance duo replaced timber beams in the structure due to termite damage. Termite treatment was necessary in the kiln room and main room and termites continue to be one of our biggest issues, along with the possum who thinks it can continually take up residence in the main building.

Our life drawing group has managed to find a new lease of life with its new coordinator, Katrina Jago, and has become quite an active gathering with a great social media presence.

The Centre held its annual members exhibition, we had an extremely successful Art Prize with its best entries to date and there were ten workshops held across the year. We also leased the Jade yurt for six months to artist Amanda Bradley, with an exhibition held in the Jade yurt at the end of the lease and we welcomed new artist Sheona White to the space for another six month lease. These leases have been a great income source for the Centre. Unfortunately the pottery exhibition was cancelled due to a number of the potters unable to participate for various reasons.

2023 will be another big year for the Centre as it celebrates its 50th year with a full calendar of events to keep the committee busy.

AGM ART DIRECTOR'S REPORT *Ingrid Russell*

2022 saw us welcome new teachers Victor Peralta, Kassidy Monsieur and Andrea Ketterling. Victor started with one landscape class on Tuesday mornings and by term two started offering a portrait class on Monday evenings. We had a new teacher, Jan Melville join us in term 2 for printmaking but unfortunately the class did not get the numbers to run. Jan was not available for following terms. Alison started a homeschool art class.

At the end of term three we held the BM Art Prize.

Alison took over managing the enrolments for term three while I was away. Enrolments were good.

Term four saw Marian Shapiro finish up her time with us. Luckily Marian encouraged Andrea Ketterling to take over the Mosaics in 2023.

Hare St Gallery Report

First quarter 2022 started in February after really good December sales. Sales were slow but steady. In second quarter we welcomed Beth Gibbeson as a gallery member. Third quarter sales remained steady. As membership of the gallery fluctuated and we were in need of some new members we decided to drop the quarterly fee and just keep the 10% commission. This saw us regain two members who had left earlier.

AGM GARDENING & GRANTS REPORT *Liz Bryden*

Grants

We applied for three grants during 2022:

ClubGrants – Category 2 – Panthers Glenbrook

Community Assistance Grant through Blue Mountains Council

Volunteers' Grant via Susan Templeman's Office

The ClubGrants application was successful. BMCAC received a \$2500 grant from Panthers Bowling Club that is being used for upgrading facilities in the Jade Yurt.

The Community Assistance Grant was successful but receipt of the grant was delayed due to an oversight within BM Council. However after internal enquiries the Council provided BMCAC with a contribution of \$990 in lieu. The contribution was allocated to repair the wooden railing along the wheel chair access ramp between the main building and the storeroom.

The Volunteers Grant application was submitted within deadline but we are still awaiting a decision. The amount available was limited to \$1000. If successful the grant would be supplemented with BMCAC funds and used to install airconditioning in the yellow Gallery Yurt.

Gardening

Mulch thus far hasn't had to be purchased as some was dumped in the park next door. After a couple of wheelbarrow loads, David Attwood kindly loaded his trailer and brought the mulch to me to distribute. This made it much easier. None to be done but I'm waiting for the cooler weather and "David's help"! So the cost of \$100 for the mulch (which had been approved) has been saved!

Suggestion – we purchase a leaf blower (Ryobi – 6 V Battery) approx. cost: under \$300.

The potters had a very busy year with some highs and lows.

Our three drop in groups generally had good attendance. It was really nice to see some previous beginner class members transfer to the drop in groups.

Over the year, our three kilns needed repairs. Baby Bear, received new elements, a new thermocouple and was converted to a computer system, Mother Bear received some new elements and a thermocouple. (The electrician is warning us this could be its last major refit). Father Bear suffered a very bad over-firing and had to receive some new elements and a thermocouple as well. During the process asbestos was revealed in the back of the kiln that resulted in a complete clean and refit of the kiln room - every cloud has a silver lining. As a result, we now have a much more workable kiln area, painted floor, new shelving system, new roller door and new timber work to replace termite damaged beams thanks to David Russell, David Attwood and Alison, who worked tirelessly to help us create the new space.

A donation to the NSW Weavers Guild of looms and weaving equipment from the storeroom has now given us a wall of shelves to store excess pottery equipment, thus negating the need for an extra shed.

A new heat gun was purchased for the pottery room and glaze ingredients for raku glazes. We have made several new raku glazes. New hoses and attachments were purchased for the raku burners. Unfortunately, our raku firing day was not so successful, as with two failed temperature gauges, it was difficult to track the temperature rises, but all who attended said they enjoyed the day and learnt a lot about the process. Let's hope 2023 is more successful.

Sadly, our Christmas "Clay Creations" exhibition had to be cancelled due to the lack of exhibitors, lack of pottery to offer for sale and because a couple of our long term prolific potters are no longer available. As a result of this experience, it was decided that, in future, our final exhibition will be a full members' exhibition, thus boosting the number of participants and articles available for sale.

We had a really good result at the Penrith Show this year with Marianne Pollpeter taking out a number of major prizes including the Penrith Council Award and Bronwyn Campbell winning the open thrown section. Ingrid Russell and Bronwyn Campbell both received encouragement awards at our annual Blue Mountains Art Prize.

2022 ended with a membership of 47 potters.

AGM LIBRARIAN'S REPORT *Gus Carrozza*

Library Usage

The Centre would like to encourage use of the library by the members as it seems that it is an underutilised resource or that members are just unaware that the books in the main (purple) building are available for borrowing.

The books are colour-coded and numbered in the following categories:

ART	Art
CRA	Craft
PA	Painting
MIS	Miscellaneous
POT	Pottery

Books in other categories (i.e.: Leathercraft, Macrame and Patchwork) have been removed as the Centre doesn't hold classes in these subjects anymore and most of these books are over 30 to 40 years old.

Older, out of date books are also occasionally removed from the library and newly donated books are added into the system to take their place. Removed books are usually placed in the main building for sale for a gold coin donation. So look out for "book sales" every now and then. Some may also be put in the street library.

If any members would like to donate art books to the library, we would be happy to take them as long as they are in good condition and not out of date.

Borrowing Instructions:

There are two boxes used for borrowing: Box A and Box B.

Find the card for the book in Box A. Fill out the card with the borrowing date, your name and phone number.

Place the card in Box B in the correct category and numerical sequence.

When **returning a book**, find the card in Box B, and note on it the return date.

Put the card back in its correct place in Box A.

Place the book back on the shelf in its correct category and number sequence.

These instructions are also written on the boxes.

If you do borrow books, please make sure you return them before the end of the term for your class. It's easy to forget once the term is over and you're not returning to the Centre after your classes are over.

Borrowing Pottery Books in the Pottery Room

Potters have an extra collection of pottery books in the pottery building and have their own borrowing system. These books are kept in the white cupboard in the pottery room.

If you wish to borrow a pottery book from the white cupboard, write your name, telephone number and the date on the sheet attached to the inside of the door.

When you return the book write down the return date and sign.

A fortnight is the preferred period of borrowing for these books.

- Katrina Jago took on facilitator role for Life Drawing in Term 2, 2022
- The brief was to reinvigorate membership and generate sufficient funds to be self-sustaining
- To do this, the group moved to pre-paid terms, in line with other BMCAC classes
- The classes are advertised on Eventbrite, plus flyers posted on local billboards and art shops
- A broad range of top-quality models were sourced (as post-Covid, many previous models were no longer available)
- Various social activities have been organised after class and between terms to increase the social contact amongst the members
- General repairs and general maintenance of our equipment was carried out, and desk-easels and various props were purchased

Resulting in: 12 full time members, and 10 casual attendees.

OTHER AGM REPORTS & BUSINESS

Membership:

At present we have 94 members including 28 potters, 3 print makers with the prospect of more joining, according to our new print coordinator, Cheryle.

The remainder are artists and mosaic artists.

Workshop Director's Report:

Alison reported we had 10 workshops during the year including Andrea Keeterlings Women's groups and chalk painting sessions.

Print Facilitator's Report:

A detailed report by Katherine Kennedy was submitted at the February meeting, along with her resignation as Print Facilitator.

Publicity Officer's Report:

Andrea reported that the usual outlets such as local newspapers and social media sites had been contacted for publicity of our events, but said that she is exploring some new avenues for advertising.

Building Officer's Report:

Sadly, due to David Russell's ill health, we don't have a builder's report to add to the excellent ones submitted by him in the past. We are all united in wishing David a steady recovery and look forward to the day when he can join us again.

David Attwood reminded us that the following work had been done:

Our beautiful new stone path from the main room to the Gallery was completed, damaged timber work in the kiln room was removed and replaced, outside lighting was replaced, and the side railing was repaired.

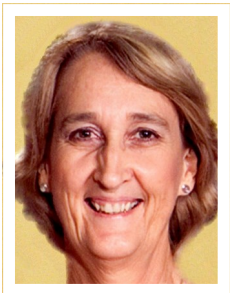

We were thrilled to be able to attend several of these outdoor activities and benefit from the experience of teacher/artists, Michael Herron and Anthony Cahill. It was also lovely to see that two of our favourite models, Sally and Olivia were featured; both wearing costumes that looked fabulous in the garden setting. We'd like to thank Sheona White from NLG for organising such a wonderful event, and look forward to her returning to our Life Drawing Glenbrook group soon.

March 2023 - OTHER OFFICERS' REPORTS & GENERAL BUSINESS

Workshop Co-ordinator's Report:

- As reported in the first 'Creations' issue of this year Mike Wall held his exhibition in January. It was an exhibition of expansive black and white landscape photography with some sales.
- Andrea has already held some very popular women's groups, crocheting etc.
- Chalk Painting workshops are planned.

Print Facilitator's Report:

Cheryle, our new print facilitator, has taken the opportunity to familiarise herself with the print room and equipment. Katherine's very comprehensive last report tabled in February will be forwarded to her. Cheryle has plans for classes in the future.

Grants Officer's Report:

Liz has applied for a Volunteers Grant.

Head Gardener's Report:

Having saved \$100 on mulch, Liz moved a motion that we buy a leaf blower with a 6 V battery. Seconded by Alison, passed with one objection.

Building Co-ordinator's Report:

- Road base has been added to the end of the path.
- A new solar light has been added to the top of the path. Our electrician says it is not possible to run electricity up to that point from the building to have a light a little less intrusive.
- Job in progress: Replacing the mouldings in the main room due to white ant damage. Please remember we are all volunteers, and the work has to be done when they are available. At times this may disrupt some groups, so please be kind and patient.

Possum boxes: Upon receiving a quote of \$65 per box, two possum boxes have been ordered from the Nepean Men's Shed.

Also, Liz and David have now installed her "possum deterrent" machine to trial in the roof. Hopefully the sonar noise will send the possums packing. Time will tell.

Mould in Print room: the issue of the mould in the print room is in the process of being addressed.

Green space between the Gallery and the public play area:

An expression of interest has been sent to the council regarding the beautifying of this area by Andrea and Alison.

\$2,500 Grant from the Glenbrook Bowling Club

The committee agreed to spend this grant for the Jade Yurt as follows.

- **Air conditioning** – David will get quotes for two airconditioners. The second for the gallery will come out of our own funds.
- **Storage** – Alison will look into purchasing both multipurpose storage cubes and a cupboard unit on wheels that can be removed from the room if required.
- **Sink** – a sink will be installed just outside the back door of the Jade Yurt, thus leaving the room walls free for needed exhibition display area.

\$990 grant from the Blue Mountains Council

David has repaired the existing wooden railing along the wheel chair access ramp to the main building. A new metal railing quoted was prohibitively expensive. We are now searching for a method to fill the sides to make it even stronger and at the same time look attractive.

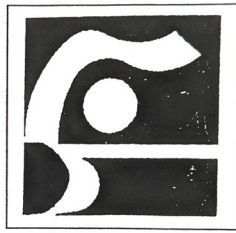

The Logo

The Centre, through its Art Director, Barbara Dahl, launched a contest to find a logo, offering a pot by Ivan Gluch to the winner.



In the latest edition of "Creations" there was mention about the mystery of the source, design and meaning of the Arts Centre logo. Nelson Wheeler, a tall Californian art teacher who was teaching at the Arts Centre at the time, won the competition for a design for a logo in 1974 or '75. The design is a stylised version of "Creative Arts Centre (C.A.C.) with symbols added. Nelson was teaching at Doonside High School at the time but returned to USA a year or two later.

As you may know, this year we celebrate 50 years of our inception. The article on the left explains the creation of our present BMCAC logo. Over the years this logo has caused some contentious discussion. Many found it didn't really relate to our Centre in an obvious way, so a few years ago it was decided to invite the BMCAC members to submit some ideas for a new logo. At that time, disappointingly, no submissions were received. It has been decided by the committee to, once again, invite the membership to submit designs for a new logo that has a more obvious connection to our Centre in colour and design.

As an incentive we are offering two years of free membership to the winning designer.

As well as the logo above our Centre also uses a couple of other logos.



This logo is used for our Hare St Gallery –collaboratively designed by Alison James and Katy Campbell. Universally loved.



Both these Blue Mountains Art Prize logos designed by Alison James have been used on occasion. Maybe we need to settle on one.



The Print Prize logo was adapted by Katherine Kennedy from Alison's design.

A comment was made that the Art Prize and Print Prize logos don't represent our Centre. But it has been argued that these events are aimed at a wider audience, the name Blue Mountains Art Prize is registered in our name and it was thought that this representation would be immediately recognisable. It is thought by some that to use these logos for these two special events is appropriate.

To give you some idea of committee thought on the logo to represent our Centre, please read some abridged comments from the meeting:

We could use the existing logo and add the yurt colours to it.

The logo should relate to the buildings and their colour.

The logo should be easily recognisable as belonging to our Centre.

The logo should also read well in black and white.

All the logos should create a cohesive brand.



For the information of new members, we also use the fliers above to advertise our Centre. Both fliers, designed in collaboration with Katy Campbell, a graphic designer, are used to advertise our Centre.

The Hare St Gallery flier is given to the information Centre at Glenbrook and is sent by them up to Echo Point. They are replenished on request by the Information Centre.

We use these fliers at all our events, and they are distributed regularly to Art Supply shops. If you notice they are out of stock, please request some to take to the shop.

Members may also request fliers for other appropriate businesses they may know of.

Fliers have only just been replenished (1,000). Including any new logos on the fliers will therefore need to wait for some time.

We look forward to seeing some really Creative designs from you all.

Proof of insurance is required

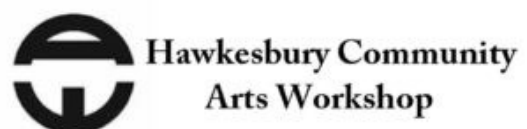

Lisa Kennedy - Featured Article

How does one juggle 'their innate desire to create' with 'motherhood'?

Lisa Kennedy, a visual artist from regional NSW in Mudgee, has a compelling story which we feel will resonate with many artists nationwide. We are currently preparing for Lisa's upcoming solo exhibition with our corporate partner WOTSO Workspace in Pyrmont and, as we continue highlighting women's concerns and achievements after recently celebrating International Women's Day, we have decided to share her journey. How does one juggle 'their innate desire to create' with 'motherhood'? It was a delight to discover where Lisa's inspiration and motivation comes from and what she's working on now.

Lisa is a part of a group exhibition at Gallery NWC in St Leonards for the month of March. A portion of the artists in these shows, like Lisa, have never exhibited their work outside their hometowns. Opportunities such as these, enable them to branch out and have their work viewed by fresh audiences. There are mixed emotions for Lisa as she speaks about her vulnerabilities and excitement. Within her own community, there is a feeling of being loved, a sense of warmth and encouragement. Exhibiting in the city brings with it a fear. It is incredibly courageous for artists like Lisa to step outside their comfort zone.

Lisa is also a mother of a two-year old daughter. All mothers out there know about the juggle in life, where we prioritise our children whilst still needing and wanting to do something for ourselves. It's not an easy juggle and one which Lisa is akin to. Art is a part of her daily existence. It's part of her soul and being, an outlet in which she can express herself and find solace in the world.

Over the last couple of years, she has had to adjust her practice to fit in with motherhood. For her, creative expression is an important part of her life and one which needs to be fulfilled. Instead of spending concentrated hours on highly detailed pictures of birds and animals, Lisa has adapted her practice by lowering her expectations of herself and finding other avenues to express herself artistically. "I've learnt to adjust by rolling with whatever comes out of me in the moments I have".



At present she is working on a collaborative project where she is co-writing and illustrating a children's book. She grabs time while her daughter sleeps in the morning or in the quiet hours of the night—to do what she loves. It offers her a time of stillness amidst the busyness of daily life. Even before motherhood when Lisa worked as a veterinarian, art played an important part in her life. By sitting down and drawing at the end of the day, it became a kind of stress release.

At the beginning of the year, Lisa set herself some realistic goals around her art. She realised that if she didn't move with intention, the year (and possibly years) would pass her by. The group exhibitions at Gallery NWC, her upcoming feature exhibition at WOTSO Pyrmont and the collaborative project she is working on are things which help Lisa to have focus and structure whilst fulfilling her innate desire to create and share.
