POTTERY FACILITATOR'S REPORT Bronwyn Campbell

Well, the last couple of weeks have been very busy. Recently I had a call from the Lithgow Correctional Centre. Their pottery program has been closed down and we have been offered approximately 60 pottery books to add to our collection. Those books we have multiple copies of will be offered for sale at a reduced price. Also, I have been invited to visit the Centre to look at tools and equipment that we may be donated.

Just a few days after that phone call, I a phone call from John Hattom, who previously ran a studio in Bathurst. He was briefly at our Centre a few years ago. As a result of that David Attwood and I travelled out to Bathurst and came home with hundreds of dollars worth of glaze ingredients which are now in our store room.



For our new members and those who may not know, all our glaze ingredients are available free of charge for pottery members to conduct glaze tests. We ask that the glaze test results be made available for everyone to see/read.

The larger amounts of glaze ingredients we have donated are available for sale at half the current "Blackwattle" price. Please ask me or your pottery teacher/ facilitator before taking large amounts of ingredients. Payment can then be worked out and placed in the black money tin. Record the amount and payment in the kiln firing book.

MEMBERS' EXHIBITION Bronwyn Campbell

Last weekend we held our first exhibition for the year at Glenbrook Theatre Hall. After checking twice that the dates and times were all correct, the theatre organiser rang on the night before to say they had made a mistake and double booked the room for Sunday. Apparently a 9pm was entered instead of a 9am giving a negative 5 hrs ?? The agreement we came to was that the potters would be out of the room at 3pm. After so much careful planning it was pretty upsetting despite profuse apologies. However, our exhibition went well and the room looked really lovely even tough we had considerably fewer pots than in the past. It was lovely to have a table of some beautiful mosaic pieces and a table for our up and coming water colourists, as well as some great pottery and art work. We had three new potters exhibiting: Hailey Wardman, Kathleen Zanardo and Jan Organ. Each of them sold work so a great addition to our exhibitions. We also had some new artists exhibiting. Our sales reached \$2,000.

Thank you everyone who helped with the exhibition. I couldn't believe how quickly the room was emptied on Sunday. We are so lucky to have such a hard working, helpful group. I would particularly like to thank David Attwood who especially came back from a holiday to transport equipment on Friday and put signs up. I would also like to give a warm thank you to Helen and Rob Still who both travelled down from Medlow Bath to assist even though neither of them had work in the exhibition.

Historically our exhibition in October has been a pottery exhibition with one guest artist, but with changing times the committee has decided to make the October Exhibition a full members' Exhibition- so put the following dates on your calendar. 20th -22nd October.

19th October setting up will be from 12pm –4pm (Workers can display work at 8:30 am Saturday) No opening night. We plan a casual champagne breakfast.

Saturday 9am—5pm Sunday 9am—5pm (Packing up will begin at 4pm to be out by 5pm.)





Hi everyone

It's been an exciting few weeks. The Escape Artists exhibition opened recently at the Haawkesbury Regional Gallery in Windsow NSW. See below.

This last weekend saw a big change for Smalti Australia of which I was co-owner with David Lacey. After 17 years, we decided to sell the business and it is now in the capapble hands of Mosaic Bazaar, based in South Australia. It will be reopening shortly.

And this weekend I'm off to Italy to join Helen Bodycomb on her mosaic study tour of Southern Italy!

Teaching

I have some workshops planned for later in the year in my home studio in Glenbrook, NSW. They are beginning to book, so secure your place with a deposit. Bookings: <u>Substrates workshops in Glenbrook, NSW | Eventbrite</u>

Bend Fold and Undulate, 21/22 September or 23/24 September. 10-5 both days.

Come to my private studio in Glenbrook NSW and learn my trademark technique for making lightweight, dimensional substrates for mosaic. On day one, we cover two methods for making lightweight non-flat wallhanging substrates suitable for interior or exterior use. You will learn to make an undulating or folded wall hanging substrate of your own design. The second substrate is hollow, such as a wall-hanging mask or torso and introduces you to the technique of sand casting. Both of these pieces are made in two stages and will need to be finished in your own time. This workshop is aimed at people with some previous mosaic experience who want to take their mosaics to a new level by making their own substrates. Limited to four people.

In the afternoon of the first day you will be given a small (approximately 20 x 25 cm) half-made folded or undulating form to to finish, including adding hanging hardware. This cures overnight ready to be worked on the next day. On day two you mosaic the substrate that you completed the day before.

By the end of the workshop you will have made two substrates up to the end of stage 1, completed a substrate including attaching hangers and other embellishments such as fringes and had experience mosaicing on a non-flat substrate. This will give you the skills to make and mosaic your own substrates from scratch at home. All materials for making substrates are supplied, including supplies to finish off your first two substrates at home. For day two, limited mosaic materials are available and you may want to bring your own material to supplement it.

Total cost of \$380 includes materials for making substrates, morning and afternoon tea, a light lunch both days and drinks and nibbles at the end of day one. Glenbrook is a lovely little village on the Blue Mountains train line and there are Airbnb properties available both in the village and nearby. We are happy to pick up people from Glenbrook station or from accommodation within about a 10-15 minute drive from Glenbrook.

Many many thanks to everyone for supporting Escape Artists, a joint exhibition with Cailtin Hepworth at the Hawkesbury Regional Gallery in Windsor NSW. We had a lovely opening weekend with a full house for the opening event, a good attendance at the artists talk on the Sunday and also at the online Share and Connect.
