POTTERY FACILITATOR'S REPORT Bronwyn Campbell

Jeannie McInnes, David Attwood and I spent a day cleaning up the area between the storeroom and the kiln room recently and did some further tidying up in the storeroom. It was a huge load for David to take to the tip, so thank you so much to both of you. David will soon imbed our new wedging table in cement behind the kiln room and give it a new weatherproof top. Although it is outside and will be a bit chilly in winter, it will be a much better surface to wedge on, as the tables in the pottery room are not ideal for wedging.

Our store of batts seems to be dwindling quite a bit. If you have borrowed some could you please return them. I am intending to buy a couple of batt mates to keep in the pottery room for throwers to use – they will not be to borrow. We are happy that one alphabet set has been located, thank you, and we look forward to the second one being returned.

I would like to encourage you all to enter pots in the **Penrith Show**. Please take the time to read the details about when to drop off work. Sadly, last year the numbers were down and if we don't support it, the Show Committee may discontinue the competition which would be very sad because it is a good way to introduce our art and craft to the public and it gives us an outlet to advertise our Centre. First and second prizes are awarded in each category (in the past \$75, \$25). The BMCAC sponsors some of the prizes. The Penrith City Council awards an overall winning prize of \$200.

POTTERY HINT OF THE MONTH: How to make your own underglazes

Buy powdered underglazes form your pottery supplier

Measure the stain with frit 4124 and bentonite by volume as follows:

1xBentonite

1x Frit 4124

2x stain

The stain is the colour, bentonite keeps it in suspension, frit fuses the colour to the pot. Mix dry ingredients add water to create a creamy consistency. It will be lumpy, leave for an hour or so and then sieve through 100 mesh sieve. Put into an airtight container. You may need to add a little more water later as bentonite absorbs the water.

When washing utensils in a clean bowl of water allow underglaze to settle, pour off water and tip colour into a container. Save all colours together and use later.

EXCEPTION: Royal Blue is a very strong stain – use the 3 ingredients in equal proportions.

Advantages: It can be painted on raw or bisque pots, mixed with other colours, it can be watered down and painted over a glaze. It is much cheaper.

Thickness matters: Too thick on top of a glaze, it will be crusty. Too thin under a glaze it will burn away and be streaky. TEST.

PRINT MAKING NEWS Cheryle Yin Lo

The printmaking studio is very active with the Monday morning classes and people staying after the classes during the open access time. Due to a Monday falling on a public holiday an extra week got added to this course when it finishes.

The Exploring Acrylic Painting group has now commenced but will finish later than other classes due to a number of classes that had to be rescheduled. The 8-week course will now finish 21 July. I have discussed with Ingrid these changes.

A couple of requests I have concerning the print studio:

Since it is stated on a notice of the studio door that a maximum of three people can be in the print studio I'm wondering whether we could relocate the two stacks of green/blue chairs and the wooden drawing horse to the store. I know that Jeannie and the team cleaned up the storeroom, but it would make a huge difference to us if they could be moved out of the studio as it affects the artists' working and movement at the press when it is in motion.

Also, Janet Saunders' father passed away who was an artist and she has donated a light table on a stand which can be more functional in that space for printmakers but we are happy for other people at the centre to use it.

I also have put my new exposure unit as a long term loan in the pent studio which means we can now use it to expose light sensitive plates for solar plate etching. Jeannie got to use it the other day.

As mentioned at the previous meeting I will also be removing some unwanted items in the studio to make sure there is not too much clutter and to ensure easy movement as safety issues are a priority.



TERRA NOVA GALLERY VISIT

Recently a friend and I visited the "Terra Nova" exhibition at the Sturt Gallery, Cnr Range Rd & Waverly Pde, Mittagong. What a lovely, tranquil place it is to visit.

The exhibition celebrates 70 years of Australia's pioneering pottery and features some of Australia's most loved and celebrated potters, all of whom have lived worked and taught at Sturt over those many years. The exhibition continues until July 16. Check out the Sturt website @sturtgalleryandstudios for more details

The exhibition ranged from delicate hand thrown, porcelain pieces of Steve Harrison to rugged, chunky hand built pieces of Paul Davis.

As well as the exhibition there is a shop area chock full of great affordable pottery, beautiful jewellery, and other crafts. A small coffee shop within the gallery provided us with a delicious light lunch followed by hot chocolate for afternoon tea. Chocolate ganache may have been involved.

Below are only some of the spectacular pots on display. We came away totally inspired and eager to get our hands into some clay. If you can, please take the opportunity to visit.



Steven Harrison: Chinese sericite single stone porcelain with home made cobalt pigments. (1,3,4) Steve experienced the terrible fires of 2019/2020. He lost his studio. The account of his harrowing ordeal during that time can be found on the internet. Flames dance around the bottom of his bowls. The titles of his pots reflect that terrible time. Two examples:

"Strange Tales of Unknown Places, or Flight or Fight are meaningless concepts to an earth worm."

"The Conflict of Inner Nature and Vital Force, or is that burning hair I can smell."

*) Jean (Hans) Arp was one of the prime instigators of the DADA movement during WW I. He is now mostly known as a sculptor. But interviewed in his mature years when he was asked which of his many modes of expression defined him best he replied: "My poetry". Here one needs to add perhaps that he defined his collages as poetry by plastic means.


